SUBJECT: REQUEST FOR WITHHOLDING INFORMATION FROM PUBLIC DISCLOSURE

Dear Mr. Klapproth:

By letter dated December 15, 1999, GE Nuclear Energy submitted Revision 2 to GE Proprietary Licensing Topical Report NEDE-32176P, "TRACG Model Description," and requested that it be withheld from public disclosure pursuant to 10 CFR 2.790. A nonproprietary version was not submitted for placement in the NRC public document room.

GE stated in its affidavit dated December 15, 1999, that the information should be considered exempt from mandatory public disclosure pursuant to 10 CFR 2.790 for the following reasons:

- "(4) a. Information that discloses a process, method, or apparatus, including supporting data and analyses, where prevention of its use by General Electric's competitors without license from GE constitutes a competitive economic advantage over other companies;
- b. Information which, if used by a competitor, would reduce his expenditure of resources or improve his competitive position in the design, manufacture, shipment, installation, assurance of quality, or licensing of a similar product;
- d. Information which reveals aspects of past, present, or future GE customer-funded development plans and programs, of potential commercial value to GE;"

We have reviewed your application and the material in accordance with the requirements of 10 CFR 2.790 and, on the basis of your statements, have determined that the submitted information sought to be withheld contains trade secrets or proprietary commercial information and should be withheld from public disclosure.

Therefore, we have determined that NEDE-32176P, "TRACG Model Description," Revision 2, will be withheld from public disclosure pursuant to 10 CFR 2.790(b)(5) and Section 103(b) of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended.

Withholding from public inspection shall not affect the right, if any, of persons properly and directly concerned to inspect the documents. If the need arises, we may send copies of this information to our consultants working in this area. We will, of course, ensure that the consultants have signed the appropriate agreements for handling proprietary information.

If the basis for withholding this information from public inspection should change in the future such that the information could then be made available for public inspection, you should promptly notify the NRC. You also should understand that the NRC may have cause to review this determination in the future, for example, if the scope of a Freedom of Information Act request includes your information. In all review situations, if the NRC makes a determination adverse to the above, you will be notified in advance of any public disclosure.
