FEMALE PARTICIPANT: They got five in trouble?

MALE PARTICIPANT: Yes. We don't know

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how bad because we ain't got no contact. We just sitting here. We just putting somebody on a plane, trying to get on a military plane, trying to get the dude to Dulles to get over there. They don't need no expertise from us. They pretty smart themselves, but --

FEMALE PARTICIPANT: You all just going be still be an offer of support.

MALE PARTICIPANT: We just going. The man told them today on the phone, don't start trying to regulate the Japanese plant. That ain't your job. They haven't asked for any help yet. Don't try to get involved like that. Just be prepared to help if it comes about, but we got people running around here in New York. We got these people want to do more. They want to analyze everything. We ain't got no information.

FEMALE PARTICIPANT: Yes, so that they can say that they responded, they was ready to respond at moment's notice.

MALE PARTICIPANT: Yes, well. I know a couple of them couldn't -- this is a statement we got from the White House. This is the only approved message. We are watching the situation very carefully and have been in touch with other agencies

as well as the government of Japan. have communicated with Japanese and offered our assistance and are government assessing the role we can play in a response effort. 5 At tonight's deputy's meeting, there's a very clear guidance they do not want us going beyond these two lines. That said, if things go badly and there 9 is some sort of meltdown tonight, which could occur 10 as early as midnight -- all right, look. You doing something, so I'm going to let you get on back 11 12 because that noise is --13 FEMALE PARTICIPANT: Well, call me back in five minutes. I can have my ear phone in. 14 15 MALE PARTICIPANT: Yes. Approximately six hours ago the same experts notified us that the cooling systems at Unit 1, 2, and 3 had been degraded/lost for about 12 hours. NRC's marginal resources and coordinate the interagency effort with the State Department, DoD, et cetera. We're arranging an interagency planning strategy call within an hour and will provide more details as the actions have more clarity. BECKY: And did Public Affairs? What we need to do just an 14 off the record comments, Senator Gillibrand and the staff 15 actually, in terms of the (indiscernible, possibly "DM") 16 point, this is the most expensive involvement we've had 17 with staff members in the two years since we've been 18 Senators that I've seen. 19 Must have eight staff people working on this 20 all the way from the top down. So that is how critically 21 important she considers this. In terms of my perspective, just so that 22 23 you know, my mission has been increased somewhat to with 24 Ben, I will be looking at all the nuclear power plants 25 in New York State and evaluating them and seeing what

their needs are and seeing what kind of parallels and what kind of issues, if they have anything like this so that we know.

In terms of my personal recommendation, I'm not at this time want to get into the issue of re-licensing or closure. We just want to deal from the perspective of Indian Point and earthquake, and information that we're going to try to get a hold of.

So I mean in my initial call, I mean I need to understand exactly more information about the faults.

I did call Entergy over the weekend and I told them it could wait until Monday morning unless I have a need to. I heard back from them over the weekend.

I spoke to Debbie Faye this morning. I've asked her to set up a meeting with some people in their PR department who can give me some more factual information so that I can educate the team here.

So basically what I want to understand is the specifics about the Indian Point fault as much as we can. I want to know about monitoring and I want an update on that.

I'd like to have some understanding on, and I know the NRC has new rules and regulations, but in a 40-year old plant, what kind of medication process that we can take. And we will be reaching out to FEMA

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and I've already reached out to the county. We will be discussing emergency management and what we need to do in that area and have a more serious discussion.

As you already know, I've never been happy with the emergency. You know, I like dealing with Rebecca and I have the highest regard for her emergency management and what we do with people and students have to be changed.

And this is an opportunity for us to do it.

I don't think what currently exists is the best way
to do it and so we're interested in addressing that.

And the fourth issue would be whether we're going to talk about, which I hope not so much, it's not an NRC issue, particularly it is a county and a for county issue. It's the possible distribution of KI tablets again which of course we did years ago.

From my perception, this is going to be very similar to post-9/11. I've been in this county since the nuclear power plant was built. Truthfully, it was always a very quiet issue until 9/11 and then it became a hot potato where my calls went up to 500 a week.

Truthfully, I think I'm going to see something similar to that now in a somewhat different environment with a governor and an AG who call for the close of the plant. But on the other hand with a county executive who's now supportive as opposed to the previous county

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executive.

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But all of that does not matter. We are going to just be dealing with the issues of the earthquake and the information we need to know in regard to Indian Point and how they deal with it. So that's what I need some help from the NRC for.

BILL: Okay.

GERRI SHAPIRO: And I don't expect it, like, today or tomorrow.

BILL: Okay. I know that Nancy has several questions that you had given her.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Right.

BILL: And we'll look to see what we can do to try and provide some intel on that.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Right.

BILL: You said you are meeting with Entergy?

GERRI SHAPIRO: I have put in and I've asked them for a call. And if I know Debbie, and I know they're drowning too in work because look, I understand that there is of course for the NRC they're helping out Japan which of course is primary. There is also the national. There were so many nuclear power plants and some of the others, particularly in California and I think in Arizona, are on faults.

The truth, and I fully understand that the

WASHINGTON, D.C. 20005-3701 manpower that it takes to deal with all this and also for Entergy to deal with also for their advocacy for where we were on the road for more, you know, nuclear power plants which truthfully, personally I have always supported.

Actually, I'm more comfortable with new plants and far more worried about a 40-year-old plant.

Truthfully, I'd rather have a new plant at the site.

plants and far more worried about a 40-year-old plant.

Truthfully, I'd rather have a new plant at the site than the plant I got. You know, from my perspective, I've got less to worry about ith that.

BILL: With or without cooling towers.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Right. You know what, I'll take it. You know what, they'll find the alternative to that. You know, I'm not crazy. That's not an issue forme. If everybody says they have a workable alternative, it's fine with me. I do care about the fish. But to be honest with you, I've got 20 million people in a 50 mile radius and my focus has always been that. That's the area in which I need to feel comfortable.

BILL: Okay.

GERRI SHAPIRO: To me that's public health and safety.

BILL: Yes I mean, you hit on a couple of things in terms of what this event is doing to us.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes.

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BILL: You know, I mean we're trying to coordinate much of our communications through headquarters because they have established a liaison with our federal partners. And I think the White House is taking a lead role in coordinating sort of the national response to this. GERRI SHAPIRO: Right. BILL: And so, we've had some challenges I think in terms of being perhaps as proactive in communicating to the public as maybe we would like to be. GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes. And I think that would be a good thing. BILL: Yes. GERRI SHAPIRO: Particularly for you to (b)(5)understand is (b)(5)

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(b)(5)Now our Chief of Staff, and he sent it to

me, got a letter, we did get a letter today which was sent to me from Constellation in regard to Calvert Cliffs, Gina, and Nine Mile and of course they quote what you're

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doing. And they also say they have something called the Severe Accident Mitigation Guidelines. BILL: Right. GERRI SHAPIRO: Now is that an NRC thing or is that their thing? BILL: That's an industry wide process or program that the NRC helped institute, which is basically establishing the Severe Accident Management Guidelines that would allow them to deal with situations that even 10 go beyond design basis (indiscernible, possibly "actions"). 11 12 GERRI SHAPIRO: Right. I'm going to need 13 to see a copy of that. I'd like to read it. I underlined 14 it because I'm not sure that I ever saw it or read it. 15 BILL: Okay. 16 GERRI SHAPIRO: So I would certainly need 17 that. My immediate concerns are, very honestly with you, there are a couple of issues in regard to, and remember 18 when I started with Indian Point it was red. 19 20 Entergy just owned it, do you know what I 21 And they've done, you know, not everything's 22 perfect but, you know, they have gone steadily up. And 23 if they put money in it, there have been improvements. 24 Two areas of concern for me has always been 25 underground piping. Always had an issue with that. And I have to tell you, I've always had an issue with earthquakes.

And this is my 11th year, I have never been satisfied for the response when I probed about earthquakes.

I've never been satisfied with an explanation about what they do with monitoring. I believe it was probably three or four years ago, I did get a whistle blower who told me the machinery wasn't even working.

So I need to know whether they have the latest technology to monitor. Do they monitor minute to minute, who's in charge of that, do you get reports on that, and is the machinery up and working and is it the latest.

I never get, and by the way Entergy knows

I want answers to that, because I've never gotten a

satisfactory answer and I'm up at the plant and supposed

to go up there in the next in the couple of weeks to

see it while it's being refueled. And by the way so

is Senator Schumer's office. So we are due up there.

Yes, would I like their monitoring equipment?

You bet I would. Would I like to see how they do it,

yes I would. So that's a concern.

In terms of the NRC's latest upgrades in regard to this, I'd like to know more specifically what I could tell the Senator and our senior management what we're doing about that. You know, what they are.

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1	And I do know that there are several meetings
2	both this afternoon and tomorrow with the LAs from several
3	offices in DC. I've already spoken to our LA. We will
4	speak again later this afternoon and I know he's going
5	to meetings today and tomorrow about this.
6	So that, you know, I want to know just, are
7	there things that this 40 year old plant can be upgraded
8	to? Can there be mitigations? And what are the obstacles
9	of that?
10	The emergency management issues and the KI

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of senatorial action, I want us to have though if we can, even though it's difficult timing, some kind of communication where you are providing information. There are options.

I mean the Senator can write a letter. You know, a letter asking specifically for that information.

We can put a timeline on it. You know, we make those things public when we do it. It's on the table for consideration.

I always deal very well with phone calls with the NRC. And I know if I ask for information and I understand there's a time that you would. But, you know, if you can give me some kind of timeline when you think that some of the issues that I'm asking about, actually there are really only two that concern you, when I could have them, when you think that you can get that to me, that would be helpful.

BILL: Okay. Letmeofferacoupleofthings, Gerri.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Right, sure.

BILL: One is, you may be aware that originally we had, on Wednesday down on the Hill, an oversight hearing on our budget.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, I do know.

BILL: Okay. That's going to be now focused

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on US plants and this Japanese event. GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, I do know that, too. BILL: So my hope is, I know that we've been feverishly as an agency working to provide our Chairman and the Commissioners with appropriate information, not plan specific like what you're asking for. But perhaps more on a generic nature, but the same kind of things. And so I'm hoping to have, by Wednesday at least, whatever was produced to support the Chairman's 10 hearing. And so that might help a little bit. 11 GERRI SHAPIRO: With locally. BILL: Yes, with globally --12 13 (Crosstalk) GERRI SHAPIRO: 14 -- yes. 15 -- not going to be so much locally, BILL: 16 but it might give us some insights in terms of what we 17 can also have for you from a local perspective. 18 GERRI SHAPIRO: Right. We are going to, 19 so you understand, I mean to be very honest with you, (b)(5)20 21 22 23 But the thing is that in truth all of these electives will feel the pressure to answer about, and 24 25 I can't speak for other states, but I will tell you what

I can speak for here.

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They will see what they need when they are asked regularly. I mean our press department is holding its breath waiting for the New York Times, and the Journal News, and Channel 12, and (indiscernible, possibly "R&N") to call.

And to be honest with you, I suspect that if it's not already happened, although they'll notify me immediately that we can expect it to happen within 24 days. We will be able to say that we've spoken to the NRC, that we've spoken to Entergy and to do that.

But they will require from her what her thinking is. I think that they will accept that we are doing our jobs collecting information. Certainly going to speak Lamont Daugherty (phonetic). I will tell you that that's an independent organization.

We will have a conversation with them that will take in New York City and Washington, DC. There will be several people on our conference call with them because they're the observatory that comments a lot about the fault in regard to Indian Point. So they will be able to provide us with some very specific information.

But it's only a question of days really until the Senator will probably be asked to respond in more detail. And it's our job as her staff to provide her

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43 with as much information as we can so she's comfortable with her response. And that's why it's timely from my perspective. I understand you have other things, but that's why it's timely for us. She will be asked. BILL: Okay, no. And I appreciate that. I appreciate all that, Gerri. And you mentioned earlier the state, Nancy had actually set up a call earlier today that I participated in where we had a number of the state 10 emergency management directors and the state liaison 11 officer where I provided them some insights and some 12 information. 13 And we talked about how we could work 14 collaboratively to provide them appropriate information 15 that they could use. You know, similar to your own needs 16 to be able to respond to constituents and others that 17 are asking questions. 18 GERRI SHAPIRO: I'm the Senator, my most 19 important person I need to satisfy at this point is the 20 Senator so that she can evaluate where she stands on

this and what bearing it would have on her overall position, Bill.

BILL: Yes. No, I know.

GERRI SHAPIRO: And that is an important consideration for her.

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BILL: Yes. No, I understand. GERRI SHAPIRO: Okay. I'm sure you can read between the lines here. BILL: Yes ma'am, yes ma'am. Okay. So let me just sort of recapture. From us you would like to have some information about, you had mentioned SAMGs. So we'll get that for in terms in terms of exactly what is a Severe Action Management Guidelines, what is their purpose, what's their intent. 10 GERRI SHAPIRO: All right. 11 BILL: Okay. And share that with you. 12 GERRI SHAPIRO: The monitoring and the 13 mitigations are going to be number 1 or 2. 14 BILL: Yes. Okay. So you're interested in what does Indian Point use to monitor? 15 16 GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, I really am. And I 17 have a feeling you're going to not be happy. 18 BILL: Okay. 19 GERRI SHAPIRO: That's what I think because it's never been, you know, as I said it's been one of 20 21 the things that has been evasive with me. 22 BILL: Okay. And then the mitigation --23 GERRI SHAPIRO: You know, what do you do 24 with a 40 year old plant? As I said, I'm not too worried 25 about any other plants. You know, I know people are

crazy about nuclear power plants, but my feeling is, you know, a new nuclear power plant has the latest bells and whistles and is able to adjust themselves. It's like talking about buildings in Japan and buildings in Haiti to me. You know, there's a big difference. But we're dealing with Indian Point with a 40 year old plant. BILL: Right. GERRI SHAPIRO: So there could be things that you say gee I wish we would now and this is what we would do, but that you could not add to a 40 year old plant. And there are probably some things that you can do.

I mean the truth of the matter is yes, you know, we want always to be able to monitor and anticipate. But we also want to understand, what can Indian Point sustain in terms of magnitude.

BILL: Yes.

GERRI SHAPIRO: What can it sustain with the fault being where it is? And from what I was reading, and some of the stuff I was reading over the weekend, it seems like there may be two small faults that crisscross under here.

And, of course, then I have a fault five minutes from my house because I live near (indiscernible,

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possibly "Ardsley"). So, you know, a couple of years ago, four or five years ago the whole house shook. So I mean it's not like that's the only fault in Westchester. BILL: Yes. GERRI SHAPIRO: So I guess I need to be educated into what, you know, what you have calculated tobe sustained. And I truly by the way understand anything that you tell the Senator or me will not become public if you ask us not to make it public. We don't do that and we never disobey that rule. BILL: No, I understand. Thank you that. GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes. BILL: You know, I mean you're obviously well aware of the fact that seismic consideration is an important part of our review of any plant's design before it can be constructed. GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes. BILL: And I can certainly verify that Indian Point has been designed to withstand, you know, the worst case and beyond earthquake that could be expected for that location. GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, see that's a key phrase to me. As a matter of fact in my report today I underlined that to withstand significant seismatic events based

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on the seismatic history of the site's geographic areas.

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I just quoted that in one of my memos today.

BILL: Right.

GERRI SHAPIRO: That's fine, you

GERRI SHAPIRO: That's fine, you know, as long as, you know, I understand the importance of historic perspective. On the other hand, this is where I currently am, just so that you know. I used to study statistics and my first job out of college was with statistics. I understand probability theory. I understand the probability here.

On the other hand, I do think as an elective and representing an elective, it is our obligation to consider the highly improbable and the consequences of such an action. Now that goes beyond the mandate in some ways of your criteria.

Your criteria is based on, I understand that for these areas of historic perspective. My feeling is that we have an obligation in wake of the Japan incident to consider beyond that in formulating policy.

BILL: I will offer you this since we're talking off the record.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes.

BILL: Is that you may be very well aware of a recent US Geological Survey Report that looked at updating the seismic, I'm not going to get the terminology right.

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GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, me neither.

BILL: But in essence, you'll look at the Eastern part of the country to see if perhaps in some areas where we now are under predicting what the possible magnitude of an earthquake could be.

And I know that there are some sites of which Indian Point is one where we are looking at that geological survey study to see if there's anything that we need to update.

GERRI SHAPIRO: My guess is you're going to find out that you probably will. You know, you see I don't have a problem that people under estimate it. I mean when you have better tools, better technology, it's like plume theory.

I mean if you speak to an IBM'er up there and what they do is plume theory, that's so different than what they did 15, 20 years ago. You know, the ability to track plume movements and where they're going to go and the predictability.

The thing is suppose you need to upgrade it assuming that it has been under estimated, which my guess is it may have. What can you do with a 40-year-old plant to change it and make it better? I mean how does one do that?

BILL: Well, I mean if you're talking about

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the fact that we might have under predicted the earthquake they need to withstand, which I don't believe is the case, Gerri.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes.

BILL: I'm just saying that the estimates have to have a change and so we need to look at Indian Point and some other facilities in terms of what do they currently have in place and is it adequate for whatever changes have been identified in the most recent US Geological Survey Study.

GERRI SHAPIRO: So does that come into play with re-licensing? And does that come into consideration that gee, we can put these building blocks in? I don't know. You know, I don't know that kind of thing. We can do this to make structures stronger. I mean are there such options as that?

BILL: I think an issue like that, Gerri, is not a re-licensing issue. I think it's a current operability issue.

GERRI SHAPIRO: But it also, current, right.

But the thing is there may be things that you can do that would improve it, but there may not be. And I guess that's my problem.

I mean that's just, you know, my problem off the top of my head is that you may want to. You

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50 know, it's like cancer. You have somebody go to the best specialist, Massachusetts General, the very best. They know exactly what should be done, but the structure of that human being, they're past that point that it can be corrected. So I guess when we talk about mitigation steps and stuff like that, that's my area of concern, and monitoring. BILL: Yes.

GERRI SHAPIRO: So those are the areas in which, and by the way I do think those are the things that, you know, depending upon what you're going to be asked about, I think you can pretty much count on a lot of Congressionals asking those types of questions.

BILL: And of course questions for every one of our 104 plants around the country.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, I know that.

BILL: Yes.

GERRI SHAPIRO: I know that. But God help me, I'm lucky enough with you guys. I only have to deal with this one and push you on this one. And the other thing is, you know, hopefully you don't have a lot of Gerri's around the country.

BILL: Well, you are unique.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, I know. I do know that.

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But the other thing I'm going to tell you is that I've already heard from some of the Congressional offices.

And what happens with a lot of them is that they know that we're on top of this so it gives them a little, there are a couple of things.

One, it gives them that opportunity that

One, it gives them that opportunity that they don't have to do it because what they do is call here. So what we say to be honest with you is critically important to them. It really does matter.

The other thing is if you look at a (indiscernible, possibly "lowy"), if you look at an angle, if you look at a (indiscernible, possibly "henchy"), if they have already called for the closing of the plant, if they already have called for not re-licensing, all this does is give them more stuff to say and they are truly protected from a political sense. They are.

BILL: Absolutely.

GERRI SHAPIRO: We don't have that.

BILL: Yes.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Don't have that. And you know what? And don't want to be in that position. That's why for me, in other words I'm going to push more for that knowledge because truthfully it's easier to be in their position.

Truthfully if you're in their position,

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you're done. You've sedated your position. You stayed where you feel. You're going to fight for it in the House.

You're going to, you know, if they convince one of the Senators to join with them, they'll fight in the Senate. It's like the Senator from Connecticut, he already has a position. He's going to fight like hell on this.

But the truth of the matter is we're in the position that I've got to know and understand it to make the case. So that's what I need you guys for. Otherwise truthfully, I would not be the person doing what I'm doing.

BILL: And I appreciate that. So we will try and get you some information that will be helpful to you.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, okay. You have any idea, and I'm not pressuring because I understand, what kind of a timeline I can tell the Senator and the State Director and the Chief of Staff and the LA and the LD?

NANCY MCNAMARA: Well, Gerri, I just know, this is Nancy again, I do know we already have a lot of correspondence on this and actually Rich Barker. You know Rich?

GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes.

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1	NANCY MCNAMARA: He's already pulling some
2	of that together with you. You know, there might be
3	for you some, obviously we have to get it through
4	headquarters on some of this other information. So I
5	know, like, the letters and correspondence of SAMG, the
6	guideline, we can certainly get you that fairly quickly.
7	GERRI SHAPIRO: Okay. Just send it over
8	and I'll read it, you know.
9	NANCYMCNAMARA: Okay,we'lldothat. We'll
10	go through David or Gene and get it to you and then
11	DAVID DECKER: Yes, that would be good.
12	NANCY MCNAMARA: the other things we
13	can kind of work through with Gene and see what we can
14	do.
15	BILL: Yes. Might have to do some work with
16	NRR and some other organizations to get some of that
17	other information.
18	GERRI SHAPIRO: Do you at the NRC, and can
19	you in regard to Indian Point, or would you consider
20	reaching out to Lamont Daugherty and just looking over
21	some of their reports, because that's what's going to
22	be on her desk?
23	BILL: Is that a person or an organization?
24	GERRI SHAPIRO: No, it's the Columbia
25	University Observatory.

BILL: Oh, okay. GERRI SHAPIRO: Okay? They are a highly respected and independent organization. They had a 2008 report on Indian Point and the New York City area in terms of seismic events. So that 2008, I don't whether they updated it. But I will tell you that tomorrow I will be reaching out directly to them. But certainly, you know, I think that it would be helpful since I think 10 a lot of people around here are going to use them now. 11 BILL: Yes, I would say the counter that we would have to that would probably be an organization 12 13 like the US Geological Survey. 14 GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes, okay. 15 BILL: USGS would probably be because, you know, we rely on them a lot --16 17 GERRI SHAPIRO: Right. BILL: -- as a matter of fact on information 18 19 regarding seismic. 20 GERRI SHAPIRO: Okay. All right. All right, 21 but as I said because they're local and they have commented on Indian Point, we will be, you know, speaking to them. 22 But, you know, I certainly appreciate it. 23 24 And Nancy if anything comes out that you 25 think that we should have showing, you know, I was saying

to the staff today what they need to do and they're really into it.

I mean, as I said, Ben's running around like crazy and so is some of the others, is we need to build up a resume, for want of a better word, of an action list of who we've spoken to, how often we speak to them and that we are on this.

You know, because somebody who stopped me Saturday night in a restaurant, why should we trust the federal government on this. They have proven to be incompetent in every other area and by the way that came from two Democrats. I mean, I was sitting and having dinner. You know, and I said thank you very much.

NANCY MCNAMARA: Did you take the middle side, the conservative side or the left side?

GERRI SHAPIRO: I am always in the middle to be honest with you. Everybody who knows me, I am in the middle. I am a problem solver. I make recommendations based on intellectual capital. I wouldn't care.

I mean, I think I'm going to get tons of calls. It's not that I wouldn't care, but I'll do the same job whether one person calls me once a week on Indian Point or 500.

NANCY MCNAMARA: So Gerri when you say you're

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building a resume of who we spoke to, is that --GERRI SHAPIRO: In other words, I will say that I spoke to Entergy, that I've spoken to the NRC, that Bill and I spoke today. I don't tell specifics by the way. NANCY MCNAMARA: Okay. GERRI SHAPIRO: But in other words, so that 8 the Senator can say if somebody, you know, if The Journal News, the New York Times, if a constituent stops her 10 and says what have you been doing, you know, and starts 11 to get, you guys are all sleeping all the time. 12 NANCY MCNAMARA: Okay. 13 GERRI SHAPIRO: She can say, you know, look 14 I tell people. I wrote to Gene on Friday night, he answered 15 me. 16 NANCY MCNAMARA: Okay. So how can I help 17 you with this? 18 GERRI SHAPIRO: Just send me any kind of 19 thing that you have. Hopefully, we'll get some 20 information and we may want another dialogue at the end 21 of the week. I mean today's Monday. 22 Maybe, you know, it doesn't have to be Bill 23 if he's busy. Somebody just so that we can have some 24 kind of contact. My guess is that our LA Ben is going 25 to have contact.

I'm sure you know the nuclear industry has scheduled all these briefings for them. That he will have contact with people and I'm sure there's going to be a lot of outreach to people. And Ben, you know, is keeping his log. We combine logs and we will, again we are looking, but do realize we are looking now at all these plants even though we don't have another one in New York State who has the issues of Indian Point. And I am waiting to hear from the governor and the AG, who I am sure are not going to be quiet on this issue. NANCY MCNAMARA: I mean do you want some generic information? GERRI SHAPIRO: And any --NANCY MCNAMARA: We can always give you a contact from USGS. GERRI SHAPIRO: Right, yes. Whatever you got. In terms of generic, I'd like if you get anything specific about IT, that is always helpful because that's what we have to gather for her. NANCY MCNAMARA: Right, I understand. GERRI SHAPIRO: Yes. And I'm hoping that Entergy will be sharing information with us. And by the way if they are not, and I think that they understand,

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you know, they've had a long term relationship with me.

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If they do not, we will become publicly critical because we need to.

In other words, you know, we are asking questions. They are there. And don't put out a generic press release or somebody say to me Indian Point can handle an earthquake. I mean, yes I know. I'm sure that they have taken lots of steps just like the NRC.

But intellectual arrogance is, you know, almost insulting. Really, I mean I think it just depends upon the situation. And by the way, Bill, I understand we got the water from the river and all of that stuff.

But there are concerns and the constituents are really concerned. And I think, I put a call into the county executive and probably speak to him later. But I think we're going to get a lot of pushback and so we need to just establish something.

So whatever you can get me, you know, and we'll see. I'm not going to bother you too much. And Bill, I'm not going to bother you unless I really am desperate here.

BILL: Okay. So that let's me know that if you do respond to me that you are desperate.

GERRI SHAPIRO: Right. That really I'm getting, and I will give you a heads up to be honest with you, when you hear from me or Gene will hear from

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If we take some actions which are on the table, I'm not going to tell you they're not. There are some actions that will be talked about in a broader sense. If the Senator feels that she may have to go on the record whether it's with requests, whether it's a letter, whether it's a hearing, you know, the options said Senators choose to do, I will give you a heads up before we make that public. BILL: Okay. Well --10 GERRI SHAPIRO: Right now today, I don't 11 feel, you know, certainly not my, right now we're in the information gathering stages which is what my 12 13 recommendation has been, is that we need the information. 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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

AUTOMATED MESSAGE: You have reached the United States Department of Energy Operations Center. Your call is being transferred to a DOE Watch Officer.

CRAIG (phonetic): Hello, Craig. May I help you?

BILL FROH: Yes. Hi. This is Bill Froh from NA41. I'm over at the NRC Ops Center. Could you transfer me over to the NIT? I had a message here just to call your number, but I think what they really meant was to call the NIT.

CRAIG: Yes. We have been getting a lot of calls.

BILL FROH: Yes, I know.

CRAIG: Hold on a second.

BILL FROH: All right. Thanks.

(Pause)

CRAIG: Okay, Bill. You're on with Warren (phonetic). Go ahead please.

WARREN: Hi. I'm sorry. Go ahead.

BILL FROH: Yes. Hi. This is Bill

Froh.

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WARREN: Hi Bill.

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1	BILL FROH: Hi. Just checking in. I'm
2	now over at the NRC Ops Office.
3	WARREN: Okay. It's still the same
4	number.
5	BILL FROH: Yes. I think it's is it
6	did you have extension 5181? Is that it?
7	WARREN: I'm looking. Hang on a second.
8	BILL FROH: All right. Thanks. Hey.
9	WARREN: 5181?
10	BILL FROH: Hold on a second.
11	WARREN: Okay.
12	(Pause)
13	BILL FROH: Okay, 5209 is the extension.
14	WARREN: 5209.
15	BILL FROH: Yes. 816-5209. Okay.
16	WARREN: Okay.
17	BILL FROH: Okay.
18	WARREN: 816, okay because we have 5100
19	from yesterday, so if we receive a specific phone.
20	Okay.
21	BILL FROH: Yes.
22	WARREN: Okay.
23	BILL FROH: That's my number. Is Dave
24	Young available? I can maybe touch base with him,
25	too?

WARREN: Sure. BILL FROH: All right. Thanks. WARREN: Hang on a second. BILL FROH: All right. (Pause) He'll be right here, okay. WARREN: BILL FROH: All right. Great. Thanks. WARREN: All right. BILL FROH: Thanks. 10 (Pause) 11 DAVE YOUNG: Bill, how's it going? 12 BILL FROH: Hey Dave. It's your 13 traveling, wandering liaison here. 14 DAVE YOUNG: You at NRC already? 15 BILL FROH: Yes. I'm at NRC. 16 DAVE YOUNG: Okay. Cool. 17 BILL FROH: Yes. 18 Anything going on over DAVE YOUNG: 19 there? 20 BILL FROH: Well, actually, they just 21 had their Exec Team briefing as I arrived, so I 22 missed like the first five minutes maybe. But they 23 were actually going over the DOE SitRep, and so they 24 had -- I guess they had, you know, there were some 25 questions back and forth and that kind of stuff.

So I can fill you in on that. can tell you now or --DAVE YOUNG: Tell me now. BILL FROH: Okay. Sure. Let's see. From what I gathered, they were saying that, haven't looked at the thing that you sent out yet. DAVE YOUNG: Right. BILL FROH: SitRep, but anyways, were talking about, I guess there was a, the thyroid 10 dose calculation for California up in there, and 11 apparently the NARAC results for a 1-year-old, for 12 the one year dose was 4 rem. DAVE YOUNG: Okay. 13 14 BILL FROH: Okay, but then I guess that was for actual deposition in California, and what 15 16 they did here is they used data from Chernobyl, and 17 they used the result from that to kind of, I guess, 18 back calculate what they thought would be a dose. And they came out with a dose of one to 10 millirem. 19 DAVE YOUNG: 20 Okay. 21 BILL FROH: So it's like 1000 times 22 less. 23 DAVE YOUNG: Yes. 24 BILL FROH: So I guess they said there 25 was some research. They're researching it through

Sandia.

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DAVE YOUNG: Okay.

BILL FROH: So, anyways, that was, I guess, one big issue they came up with. Let's see. What else? Oh, and then someone was asking about the discrepancy between the U.S. and Japan and the spent fuel pool levels.

So they kind of discussed that, and I don't know if you need to get into that, but basically, probably nothing new. They just were told that there was no integrity to retain the water, so they looked at some visual evidence, they said, showing — to see if there was water in the pool.

DAVE YOUNG: Okay.

BILL FROH:

(b)(5)

and it didn't -- well, the Japanese tried to show them a visual that showed, they thought showed water in the pool, but they said it wasn't that convincing.

And also NRC was (b)(5)
showing vapor coming from Number 3, but then little
or no vapor coming from Number 4 --

DAVE YOUNG: Oh.

BILL FROH: -- which made them think,

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well maybe Number 4 has no water --DAVE YOUNG: Right. BILL FROH: -- covering the pool, but Number 3 does. DAVE YOUNG: Right. BILL FROH: Okay, and they also looked at exterior images of the building showing more damage to Building Number 4, which also would kind of lead them to think that there's perhaps more 10 damage to the spent pool, spent fuel pool. 11 But anyways, they're thinking, you know, 12 they're going with that based on the evidence they've seen, that there's no water. 13 14 DAVE YOUNG: No water in Four. 15 BILL FROH: No water in Four, yes. Ι don't know if that's that helpful or --16 17 DAVE YOUNG: Yes, I hadn't even looked 18 at our SitRep brief. 19 BILL FROH: You're literally in the same 20 boat as me. Yes. 21 DAVE YOUNG: Yes, we're trying to do 22 but we're probably not going to, turnover, 23 people are just going to leave, and we'll have to --24 each person will have to read the brief for himself. 25 BILL FROH: Yes. Okay, but, okay.

1	DAVE YOUNG: No, that's good information
2	though.
3	BILL FROH: All right. Okay.
4	DAVE YOUNG: I'll pass it on.
5	BILL FROH: Okay, did you get any
6	feedback on the flyover or anything, in general?
7	DAVE YOUNG: Just something, the brief.
8	BILL FROH: Yes.
9	DAVE YOUNG: I haven't tracked it
10	because I got here, and I haven't read anything.
11	But I know they did some flyovers, and there's some
12	maps in the brief, like pulled from a map.
13	BILL FROH: Oh okay.
14	DAVE YOUNG: Overall, there isn't any
15	data in there, but it's just
16	BILL FROH: Okay.
17	DAVE YOUNG: At least we know where they
18	flew out.
19	BILL FROH: Oh okay.
20	DAVE YOUNG: I don't know. I have to
21	look at it.
22	BILL FROH: Okay. Was there an overall
23	opinion? Is it look good, look better, worse than
24	they thought?
25	DAVE YOUNG: I didn't hear if there was

an opinion or not. BILL FROH: Oh, okay, so I guess we'll have to look at it. DAVE YOUNG: Yes. BILL FROH: Okay. All right. Well, I gave him my number today. I don't know if you -it's probably up on the board now. I don't know. I'm at 5 --DAVE YOUNG: Can you give it to me 10 again? 11 BILL FROH: Yes. It's 301. 12 DAVE YOUNG: This is your cell phone? 13 Okay, it's not your cell phone. 14 BILL FROH: Well, here's the desk phone. 15 It's 301-816. 16 DAVE YOUNG: 816. 17 BILL FROH: 5209. 18 DAVE YOUNG: 5209, and then your cell 19 phone and your Blackberry still work? 20 BILL FROH: The Blackberry still Yes. 21 works, and actually the, my cell phone here works, 22 too, so. 23 DAVE YOUNG: Okay. I do know that their 24 line is recorded, so we're talking about them behind 25 their backs, we might not want to --

3	BILL FROH: We won't do that.
4	DAVE YOUNG: So, okay. Cool.
5	BILL FROH: All right.
6	DAVE YOUNG: All righty.
7	BILL FROH: That's it, and I'll keep you
8	up-to-date and talk to you later.
9	DAVE YOUNG: Okay.
10	BILL FROH: All right Dave. Take care.
11	DAVE YOUNG: Appreciate it.
12	BILL FROH: All right. Talk to you
13	later. Bye bye.
14	(CONFERENCE CALL ENDED.)
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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

JIM FURABEL (phonetic): Jim Furabel.

BILL FROH: Hey Jim. It's Bill Froh.

JIM FURABEL: I just got an email from you.

BILL FROH: Yes. You got it already? That was quick.

JIM FURABEL: It popped up just before the phone rang.

BILL FROH: That's odd. I didn't know it would go that fast. Yes, I just sent it to you because I got the latest briefing from DOE, and I'm at NRC now in their Ops Center.

JIM FURABEL: You are. You made it into the Ops Center.

BILL FROH: I made it. I'm the wandering liaison.

JIM FURABEL: How are you? Your clearance got passed, and everybody was aware that you were coming and --

BILL FROH: Yes, I don't know if they have -- I mean they didn't check for the clearance yet, but they can get that. I know it was passed, but they just -- I guess they figured that I don't

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need it unless I'm going to be here for a while. BILL FROH: So they're going to -- I'll check on that and make sure that they got it. JIM FURABEL: All right. BILL FROH: But yes, and I emailed Vince all the information he needs to make it to USAID. His clearance wasn't there yesterday evening, so. JIM FURABEL: Vince going or was Buntman going? 10 BILL FROH: I thought it was Vince. 11 That's what the email said. The last email I saw I 12 think said Vince. 13 FURABEL: JIM Because during the 14 discussion about it, I thought it was Buntman. 15 BILL FROH: Oh. JIM FURABEL: But I, again, who knows? 16 17 BILL FROH: Oh okay. Well if it 18 changed, then well, I don't know. I can actually --19 I got Buntman's phone. I could call him. 20 he's there. 21 JIM FURABEL: I saw Vince about 7:00 22 this morning. 23 BILL FROH: Okay, unless he was going to 24 go from there to Hanover. I don't know. 25 JIM FURABEL: Who knows? I know right

now I don't even care. BILL FROH: That's true. One or the other. JIM FURABEL: Exactly. BILL FROH: Yes, but. JIM FURABEL: You sound chipper this morning. BILL FROH: Do I? Do I really? It's a put on I think. 10 JIM FURABEL: I think so because I got, 11 that email I got was 8:40 last night. 12 BILL FROH: Oh yes. It was. That was 13 quite late. Yes, I was trying to leave there, and I 14 had -- a question came up, and okay. Let me check 15 on this, and then I guess another question came up, 16 so I couldn't leave. 17 And then I need an escort to leave, so I 18 had to wait for someone who was actually getting up 19 to go to the bathroom or something and then beg them 20 to take me down to the lobby. 21 It was really pathetic. Yes, 22 pretty pathetic. Yes, you can't get out the gate at 23 the bottom of the elevator lobby unless someone has 24 a badge to open the gate because I tried to just

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leave.

I said screw this. I'm just going to leave, and I went down. And oh, I can't get out. There's no guard there or anything.

JIM FURABEL: You have such an interesting life.

BILL FROH: Yes, so I was wandering

BILL FROH: Yes, so I was wandering around the whole building, so I had to go back up to the eighth floor and there was somebody leaving. So I went back down and left the appropriate way. It was all in the up and up.

JIM FURABEL: My goodness.

BILL FROH: Yes, but yes, it was late and I was, you know, the big deal yesterday was they were all looking to DOE's flyover with, yes, the --getting the NARAC plots and everything after they do their flyover.

That wasn't going to happen until well, they weren't getting results back probably until at least midnight our time last night, so I figure I'm not going to stay around for that.

JIM FURABEL: No.

BILL FROH: But there were people there that were, you know, they were kind of hoping that the flyovers when they did that, the monitoring would show maybe less severe than what they were

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getting elsewhere from other sources. JIM FURABEL: I doubt it. BILL FROH: Yes, so, but they did have their executive brief here right when I got here at NRC, and I guess -- I haven't even looked at the DOE SitRep, but I guess in there they had some dose estimates for California that somebody had requested. And for something like, let's see, what 10 was it? I think it was like for a 1-year-old 11 thyroid dose for one year. The NARAC plot came up 12 with 4 rem. But then they did --JIM FURABEL: NRC? 13 (b)(5)BILL FROH: 14 And then 15 they did a, using Chernobyl data, they used that and somehow calculated one to 10 millirem, so 1000 times 16 17 And I kind of came in right in the middle of 18 that, but that's what they were talking about. Yes. I tell you. 19 JIM FURABEL: Those kinds 20 of numbers are really dangerous. 21 BILL FROH: Yes. 22 JIM FURABEL: You've already got people 23 buying iodide tablets. 24 BILL FROH: I know. They're selling 25

out. Yes.

JIM FURABEL: Yes. Now we'll buy that up. The whole thing's crazy. BILL FROH: Yes, so they're researching it with Sandia to try to I guess get to the bottom of it. JIM FURABEL: Yes, I'm shocked at the number 4 rems. BILL FROH: I am, too. I have to look at it and see where they got that, see how that was 10 figured if it's in there, any background on it. 11 JIM FURABEL: Well, it's going to be an 12 interesting day. Yes it will. Yes, and they 13 BILL FROH: 14 just talked about, at the exec meeting they were 15 talking about the discrepancy between the U.S. and 16 Japan as far as the water level in the --17 JIM FURABEL: Yes. 18 BILL FROH: -- spent fuel pool, and I 19 guess Japan was trying to show some visual evidence 20 to the NRC guys that showed water in the pool, (b)(5)21 22 23 So that kind of led them to think, well, 24 25 there's no vapor. Must not be any water in Number

1	4. And I guess also they saw on the exterior there
2	was more damage to the building
3	JIM FURABEL: Yes.
4	BILL FROH: in Number 4, so that also
5	might lead them to think well that would, it's
6	possible that there was more damage to the
7	containment for Spent Pool Number 4.
8	JIM FURABEL: And the Japanese thing was
9	from a helicopter out of the (indiscernible, "the
10	vaish"), I believe.
11	BILL FROH: Is that right?
12	JIM FURABEL: I wonder if the helicopter
13	was just pouring water.
14	BILL FROH: Well that's not yes.
15	JIM FURABEL: So I'm not sure how valid
16	that one is either.
17	BILL FROH: Yes. So they're based on
18	
19	of Japan's position, (b)(5)
20	(b)(5) And that's it.
21	JIM FURABEL: Oh boy.
22	BILL FROH: Yes, right.
23	JIM FURABEL: Well, keep track of your
24	extra hours.
25	BILL FROH: Okay. Yes.

JIM FURABEL: And we'll try to make them up to you. BILL FROH: Okay. That's good, and. JIM FURABEL: We'll lay the path for Freshwater. (b)(6)BILL FROH: Okay. Yes. (b)(6)(b)(6)so 9 is Freshwater able to come in here in the morning? 10 JIM FURABEL: Yes, I believe so. 11 BILL FROH: Okay. 12 JIM FURABEL: I'll talk to him when he 13 gets in here. 14 BILL FROH: Okay, and I'll give him a 15 call later and give him the low down on this place. Yes, just make sure that 16 JIM FURABEL: 17 they're expecting him tomorrow and not you. 18 BILL FROH: Right. Yes. We'll keep 19 them guessing. 20 Well you guys can't JIM FURABEL: 21 exactly pass as twins. 22 BILL FROH: That is true. That would be 23 a neat trick. JIM FURABEL: Well you're going to have 24 25 another interesting day tomorrow, too.

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1		BILL FROH: Yes, I will.
2		JIM FURABEL: Indeed.
3		BILL FROH: If it's not one thing, it's
4	another.	
5		JIM FURABEL: Yes. Well, I guess better
6	you than me	is all.
7		BILL FROH: Yes. You wearing your green
8	socks today?	
9		JIM FURABEL: I'm wearing my green tie
10	today.	
11		BILL FROH: Green tie. Okay.
12		JIM FURABEL: This is the one that has
13	shamrocks on	it.
14		BILL FROH: All right.
15		JIM FURABEL: I am decked out. All
16	right.	
17		BILL FROH: All right.
18		JIM FURABEL: Keep in touch.
19		BILL FROH: I sure will.
20		JIM FURABEL: And duck if you have to.
21		BILL FROH: Exactly. Good advice.
22		JIM FURABEL: Okay. Take care.

BILL FROH: Hi. I'm trying to reach Dave Young please. Bill Froh.

NIT: Bill Froh? Okay, just a second.

BILL FROH: Yes. Thanks.

(Pause)

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DAVE YOUNG: Hey Bill. What's up?

BILL FROH: Hey Dave, got a quick one for you probably. It's interesting. I was just talking to the Director of the Ops Center here, Mark Lombard, and I don't know all the details but they're trying to find hardened vehicles to send over there I guess to go into the area for something.

Anyways, the director here, he was interested in seeing what NNSA might have as far as like security vehicles, so he gave me a name. So I just want to find the guy's phone number and see if I can talk to him. So I need you to look up a number in the directory.

10	DAVE YOUNG: Okay.
11	BILL FROH: Kevin is his first name. He
12	may not still be there, but.
13	DAVE YOUNG: Do we want them to do that
14	though?
15	BILL FROH: I don't know. I mean I
16	think they're just researching this, so I could find
17	out more about it. This is just I think he was
18	just brainstorming.
19	DAVE YOUNG: Yes. Do you mind sending me
20	an email saying that they're looking for this guy
21	for, I don't know, the reason you gave me.
22	BILL FROH: Right.
23	DAVE YOUNG: And then I can send it to
24	the policy people. Let them decide.
25	BILL FROH: Okay. Yes, okay. They
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might have some more questions I would think, but. DAVE YOUNG: And then let the NRC know request. We let our sent a leadership know that you have this request, and they'll let, we'll let you know if it's a plausible request. BILL FROH: Yes. DAVE YOUNG: Because I would think why would they come to us instead of DOD? 10 BILL FROH: Right. Well I know they're 11 going --12 DAVE YOUNG: We might have stuff, but I 13 doubt it. 14 BILL FROH: Yes. He was -- I mean he 15 used to work in security I guess, and I think he 16 spent some time at NNSA even. So he was just --17 DAVE YOUNG: Okay. 18 BILL FROH: -- I think brainstorming, 19 and I know they're, they just made a call. 20 trying to call NASA. NASA has a, some kind of 21 recovery vehicle and they had a picture of it. 22 looks pretty gnarly and pretty strong. 23 I really don't know any more than that, 24 but I figured I might as well check and see if the 25 guy's there. But anyways, I'll send you an email.

Do it that way. DAVE YOUNG: Send me an email of it. I'll forward it up and then let them take care of it. I don't know if we want them to do that. BILL FROH: I got you. Yes. DAVE YOUNG: More of a --BILL FROH: Right. DAVE YOUNG: Or if you want, you can have NRC send us an email --10 BILL FROH: Right. 11 DAVE YOUNG: -- making this request 12 through us. Actually, I think that makes more 13 sense. 14 BILL FROH: Yes. 15 DAVE YOUNG: Have them make that request 16 officially through us. Then we can pass it up. 17 BILL FROH: Okay. 18 DAVE YOUNG: Give them the NITOps 19 email and just have them make that (phonetic) 20 request through us. BILL FROH: 21 Okay. That sounds good. 22 Yes, I like that. 23 DAVE YOUNG: More sense. 24 BILL FROH: Yes, that would be the 25 proper way to do it.

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DAVE YOUNG: Yes.

BILL FROH: Okay. Great. All right.

Thanks Dave.

DAVE YOUNG: All right. Thanks Bill.

BILL FROH: Bye-bye.

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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

BILL FROH: I'm trying to reach Dave Young. This is Bill Froh.

23	ready.
24	BOB CARROLL: I'm ready.
25	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. 301.

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1	BOB CARROLL: 301.
2	DAVE FRESHWATER: 816.
3	BOB CARROLL: 816
4	DAVE FRESHWATER: 5209.
5	BOB CARROLL: 5209, and you're at NRC.
6	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
7	BOB CARROLL: (Indiscernible, sounds like
8	"all I want to know"). Okay.
9	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay, can you put my email
10	address into your distribution stuff?
11	BOB CARROLL: I think so. Yes.
12	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.
13	BOB CARROLL: Dave.Freshwater?
14	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. Headquarters
15	address because I can get in. I should be able to get
16	in. Or at least I'm hoping to. We'll find out from after
17	I get started.
18	BOB CARROLL: Okay, are you Headquarters,
19	or are you NNSA.doe.gov?
20	DAVE FRESHWATER: Either one works.
21	BOB CARROLL: Okay.
22	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. Hey. Have you seen
23	Peter Lyons, who's a former NRC Commissioner, around
24	there?
25	BOB CARROLL: No I have not. Not this
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morning. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Is he floating in and out of there or just? BOB CARROLL: He has. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. BOB CARROLL: You know, I saw him, he came through, he bopped through here two or three times yesterday. But I haven't seen him yet this morning. DAVE FRESHWATER: They're looking for him up here, so if you see him, give me a call or have him 10 11 give me a call and then I'll try and do what else it 12 is they say happen next. 13 BOB CARROLL: Okay. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. 14 15 BOB CARROLL: You want me to pass the word for him to give you a call? 16 17 DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. BOB CARROLL: Okay. 18 19 DAVE FRESHWATER: Beth Reed up here, who's our point of contact, just came to me and said that she's, 20 21 they're looking for him and looking for a number, so. BOB CARROLL: Looking for a number? 22 23 DAVE FRESHWATER: Looking for a number to 24 contact him at. 25 BOB CARROLL: Oh. Oh, okay.

3	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
4	BOB CARROLL: All right.
5	DAVE FRESHWATER: And I'll call the WATTS,

8	If you're on the RR Website, he should have an email
9	up there. And if you can get into your email, you should
10	be able to get his phone number, too.
11	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. I'll look, but I
12	just haven't started yet.
13	BOB CARROLL: If I see him, I'll give him
14	your number
15	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
16	BOB CARROLL: or Beth have a number?
17	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. Hold on a second.
18	301.
19	BOB CARROLL: 301.
20	DAVE FRESHWATER: 816.
21	BOB CARROLL: 816.
22	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. 5208.
23	BOB CARROLL: 5208. Okay, I'll put a note
24	up on the door right here.
25	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.
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BOB CARROLL: All right.

DAVE FRESHWATER: All right. Thanks Bob.

BOB CARROLL: Okay. Take care.

DAVE FRESHWATER: All right.

BOB CARROLL: Talk to you later.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes, probably a lot today.

(CONFERENCE CALL ENDED)

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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

DAVE FRESHWATER: NRC Operations Center, DOE Liaison, Dave Freshwater.

JOSH BECKHAM (phonetic): Hi.

DAVE FRESHWATER: This is a recorded line.

JOSH BECKHAM: Yes. Hi. It's Josh Beckham with Chairman Jaczko. How are you?

DAVE FRESHWATER: Pretty good.

JOSH BECKHAM: I was trying to reach our folks at the USAID Response Center. Do we have the contact information for them?

JOSH BECKHAM: Okay.

DAVE FRESHWATER: 712.

JOSH BECKHAM: Okay.

DAVE FRESHWATER: 4384.

JOSH BECKHAM: 4384, and that's our folks.

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DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes, that's the NRC folks.

JOSH BECKHAM: Great. Thanks.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.

JOSH BECKHAM: 4384 right?

DAVE FRESHWATER: Right.

JOSH BECKHAM: Thanks.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Sure.

(CONFERENCE CALL ENDED)

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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

MAJOR DUNLAP: Data Ops. This is Dunlap. How may I help you?

DAVE FRESHWATER: Good morning. This is Dave Freshwater, Liaison up at NRC. My line's a recorded line. Hey. I have a question. NRC has a question for us.

MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay, sir.

DAVE FRESHWATER: The Japanese have asked.

We're apparently (b)(5)

MAJOR DUNLAP: Right. Yes, I don't think

we've got that capability, but let me double check with you on that one, sir.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.

MAJOR DUNLAP: I think we're going to have to follow up with an official tasker via email.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. All right. As soon as I get into email, I can try and do that, too.

MAJOR DUNLAP: Are you there, sir?

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1	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. I'm still here.
2	MAJOR DUNLAP: Oh okay. Stand by. Sorry.
3	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.
4	(Pause)
5	BOB CARROLL (phonetic): Hello.
6	DAVE FRESHWATER: Hello.
7	BOB CARROLL: This is Bob Carroll.
8	DAVE FRESHWATER: Hey Bob. Dave Freshwater.
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10	BOB CARROLL: Hey. Oh Dave.
11	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
12	BOB CARROLL: Bob again.
13	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
14	BOB CARROLL: Yes. We've that'd be a
15	DoD function and
16	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. They're reaching
17	out to them, too, but they asked us, too. They reached
18	us, so.
19	BOB CARROLL: Yes. (b)(5)
20	(b)(5) , but that's about
21	it.
22	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.
23	BOB CARROLL: I don't think there's any
24	we wouldn't be (b)(5)
25	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.
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1	BOB CARROLL: So, but I think that has been
2	done.
3	DAVE FRESHWATER: Oh I know that Beth Reed
4	here is reaching out to DTRA and the DoD (b)(5)
5	(b)(5) so she asked
6	me to check too, so.
7	BOB CARROLL: Oh okay. Yes. I don't know
8	about the results.
9	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
10	BOB CARROLL: I'd have to ask our (b) guys.
11	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. She thought that
12	there might be something inside some of our teams, but
13	I don't know if we got those teams deployed either so.
14	BOB CARROLL: When Blumenthal and Cou
15	(phonetic) call in here, I'll give them a call. I'll
16	ask them.
17	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.
18	BOB CARROLL: All right.
19	DAVE FRESHWATER: All right.
20	BOB CARROLL: And all's a go.
21	DAVE FRESHWATER: You need me to send you
22	this to you in email?
23	BOB CARROLL: Yes, if you would. Just
24	address it to NIT Ops.
25	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. No, I got the
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address.

BOB CARROLL: Oh okay.

DAVE FRESHWATER: I'm just trying to get started up here in things and it's a lot. It's a computer lash up, too, so. You know how that goes when you can

BOB CARROLL: Oh yes.

DAVE FRESHWATER: -- walk out to someplace else, so all right.

BOB CARROLL: Okay. Take care.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Thanks Bob. Bye.

DAVE FRESHWATER: NRC Operations Center, DOE Liaison Desk, Dave Freshwater. This is a recorded line.

JOE ANDERSON: Yes, Dave. This is Joe Anderson. I'm up at the USAID.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hi.

JOE ANDERSON: Yes, I was just calling to try to determine a status and who should be the point of contact for these people wanting to fly to Japan. I had talked to a Mr. Denbeck (phonetic) I guess up at the international programs.

And he was kind of caught off guard, wasn't aware of the priorities or exactly what it seemed like he should be doing.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Hold on a second. (Pause)

(CONFERENCE CALL ENDED)

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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

KAREN: NIT Operations. This is Karen.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hi Karen. This is David Freshwater, Liaison up at NRC for us. This is a recorded line, too. Hey. I've sent a couple of email messages on stuff that's going on up here down to NIT Ops, wanted to make sure that if anybody's got any questions that I called and followed up.

KAREN: Okay. Let me give you to Dunlap and verify that the emails have been received.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.

KAREN: And we'll know if they have any other questions okay?

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Thanks.

(Pause)

MAJOR DUNLAP: Good day, sir. This is Major Dunlap.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hey Major Dunlap. This is Dave Freshwater. I'm up at NRC. I'm our Liaison, and this is a recorded line.

MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.

MAJOR DUNLAP: You're Dave Freshwater from our office?

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1	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
2	MAJOR DUNLAP: Yes. Yes, sir, and you sent
3	files, and you want to verify that they are on NIT Ops?
4	DAVE FRESHWATER: I sent you guys some emails
5	at NIT Ops, some stuff I'm hearing about what's going
6	on over here.
7	MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay.
8	DAVE FRESHWATER: Including one that's
9	actually a little bit of a question from them for us.
10	MAJOR DUNLAP: I see that. I've got one
11	email here that you just sent at 11:30.
12	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
13	MAJOR DUNLAP: (b)(5)
14	(b)(5)
15	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
16	MAJOR DUNLAP: So this one for Debbie. You
17	want her to handle this?
18	DAVE FRESHWATER: Well, no. I just want
19	this is for you guy's information, so something's
20	going on outside of probably your circles.
21	MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay.
22	DAVE FRESHWATER: And, you know, the Admiral
23	does wear a DOE hat sometimes.
24	MAJOR DUNLAP: Roger that.
25	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. There's another one
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to you guys about a Japan RAD Map that's a forwarded message. MAJOR DUNLAP: From you. Okay, there it is, Japan RAD Map. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. MAJOR DUNLAP: Is there action? DAVE FRESHWATER: I just need to -- probably you guys just need to confirm what I think the situation is, which is yes, we understand that EPA has some assets, 10 and if we get a valid request we appropriately divvy 11 up the support requirements. 12 MAJOR DUNLAP: I'll pass that on to Dave 13 or Debbie --DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. 14 15 MAJOR DUNLAP: -- to make the decision on. 16 I'll just triage an email through them. 17 DAVE FRESHWATER: No. I understand, and 18 I'm trying to do the same thing for you guys is when I hear something weird, you know, that's what -- I'm 19 20 your ears. 21 MAJOR DUNLAP: All right. DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. 22 23 MAJOR DUNLAP: All right. 24 DAVE FRESHWATER: I mean I did too long in 25 the Army not to know how to be a Liaison Officer.

MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Al

DAVE FRESHWATER: All right. Have a good

one.

(CONFERENCE CALL ENDED)

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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

BOB THEROW: This is NIT.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hi. This is Dave Freshwater at the NRC OC. I'm the Liaison up here today, and my line is a recorded line.

BOB THEROW: Hey Dave.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hey. Who's this?

BOB THEROW: This is Bob Therow.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hey Bob. Hey, I got another interesting one for you, or at least I'm trying to confirm. The people, the State Liaisons up here have gotten a question about, I mean like for EPA, they're sampling filters around the country.

Where does that information kind of go to?

And they've extracted from the talking points up here that DOE's the lead and that of course NARAC's monitoring what NARAC's monitoring and that if there's anything questions about any of this that the questions go to DOE at phone number, from (b)(6)

BOB THEROW: (b)(6) Who is that?

DAVE FRESHWATER: Beats me. I was hoping you guys would know.

BOB THEROW: I had -- that name doesn't -- that number doesn't ring a bell. And you're saying that

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all the EPA monitoring in the country goes to, comes to DOE? DAVE FRESHWATER: Well they've got some questions and some of the states have, you know, are agreement states, so they monitor things for EPA. So they're out pulling the filters out of the continuous earth samplers. BOB THEROW: Right. DAVE FRESHWATER: Where the results from that stuff would go, which means it's data. It's data 10 11 input, so it should come back to us. BOB THEROW: Well --12 13 DAVE FRESHWATER: If we're, you know, 14 because we're in charge of coming up with the federal 15 picture right? 16 BOB THEROW: I'm not sure we are, but let 17 me ask here. Just a second. 18 DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. 19 (Pause) 20 BOB THEROW: Hey Dave. It's an EPA system 21 called RadNet. 22 DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. 23 BOB THEROW: R-a-d-N-e-t, and the filters 24 are all shipped to somewhere in Alabama. I would assume 25 Anniston because that seems like that Anniston.

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1	DAVE FRESHWATER: No. EPA's got a lab in
2	Montgomery.
3	BOB THEROW: Oh do they? Okay.
4	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
5	BOB THEROW: Well, it's going to Alabama
6	and then there's 117 sites, sniffing sites around the
7	country.
8	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
9	BOB THEROW: And I'd we may be on the
10	receiving end of some of the data, but we don't produce
11	it.
12	DAVE FRESHWATER: Right. Yes, it becomes
13	input to us.
14	BOB THEROW: Yes.
15	DAVE FRESHWATER: And that's what I think
16	they were doing. I mean that's the answer I think they
17	were providing, or the answer or somebody at (b)(6)
18	about to get a phone call.
19	BOB THEROW: Yes. I don't know who (b)(6)
20	is.
21	DAVE FRESHWATER: They'll be nice to you.
22	I'll trace it for you, okay?
23	BOB THEROW: Okay.
24	DAVE FRESHWATER: And then I'll get you
25	something back that tells you who (b)(6) is.
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BOB THEROW: Hey listen. Just send us an email at NIT Ops. NITOps@nnsa.doe.gov. DAVE FRESHWATER: No, I do. I've sent a couple of other ones of things I'm finding out from around here, but this one was like more of a right now kind of thing. So that's why I called. BOB THEROW: Okay. DAVE FRESHWATER: And partly because, you know, yes MPA's no, they run their filters through their 10 own labs. They don't send them our labs. BOB THEROW: That's correct. 11 12 DAVE FRESHWATER: But the data from that 13 comes to us because that's our job under NRF and all 14 the rest of those things, but --15 BOB THEROW: I don't know. I assume, I would 16 assume we would get it eventually. 17 DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. BOB THEROW: But by then it's days or weeks 18 old. 19 DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes, but I mean some of 20 these things, you know, I know what the rules say, but 21 22 before I definitively say it, I turn back and check with 23 you guys. It's just like there's a -- I've got a question 24 25 down to you from that went to NIT Ops about a quarter

after 11 this morning. That's another one of those things of, yes EPA has, you know, somebody suggested EPA deploy assets, has assets that might be able to be deployed. And the answer up here was that's DOE. They're in charge, and so I kind of have its rapid answer, which is yes, we're aware that EPA has assets and if we get a valid request, then we apportion the assets appropriately. BOB THEROW: Yes. DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes, but before I give 12 it out, I run it past you guys until you guys say yes 13 because I know better even before. I'm not for sure whether I was taught that at our fine institution of 14 15 higher learning or before even then. So, all right. 16 I'll let you get back to it. 17 BOB THEROW: Okay. Thanks. DAVE FRESHWATER: All right. Thanks Bob. 18 19 Bye. 20 BOB THEROW: Okay. Bye. (CONFERENCE CALL ENDED) 22

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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

NIKITA (phonetic): Public Affairs. This is Nikita.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hi, this is David Freshwater.

I'm in NA-41 usually. I'm our Liaison up at Nuclear
Regulatory Commission for the Japan incident.

And they had this phone number on it for questions about things that DOE was doing. And none of us knew where the phone number was, so that's why I called it.

NIKITA: That phone number goes to the Office of Public Affairs in DOE.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. No, that's why I called.

NIKITA: Sure. Let me see if I can get a press officer to speak with you.

DAVE FRESHWATER: No, no, no. This is what I needed. They took some -- the NRC people took some information out of talking points, and this number was listed as some place to call with questions about DOE, which, you know.

NIKITA: Questions from whom?

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hold on a second.

(Pause)

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DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Maybe when we talk to a press officer, okay? NIKITA: Sure. Just so like if you have questions you should call here. It's the press' questions you can direct them here, but that's about it. I just wanted to make sure that that was what was listed. DAVE FRESHWATER: Well I'm going to read you what they said. I'm going to want to read to somebody what they say so that then, of course, we can get the right number if it's not the right number. NIKITA: Okay. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay, so if you can answer it, or you want to confirm it with somebody else, then we'll do it that way. NIKITA: Sure. Go ahead. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Department of Energy has been designated the lead agency for communicating information to the states, you know, like Alabama, Georgia, regarding monitoring of radiation heading toward or over the United States. The DOE's Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, National Atmospheric Release and Assessment Center is monitoring weather patterns over the Pacific Ocean.

The EPA maintains their monitoring stations

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throughout the country and has reinforced its monitoring effort. DOE will provide aerial wandering. Questions about this effort should be directed to DOE at 202-586-4940. NIKITA: That's fine. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. NIKITA: Thank you. DAVE FRESHWATER: No, and thank you. I mean I -- when I first read it I thought this was going to, 10 you know, there's a potential that you guys are going to get some technical questions, which I know then probably 11 12 goes back downstairs to the Nuclear Incident Team 13 operations in NRC. NIKITA: Yes. I think it's just helpful 14 though that we get the questions first. 15 DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. 16 17 NIKITA: Since I'm sure there'll be a range of technical to not so much. 18 DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. 19 20 NIKITA: Great. 21 DAVE FRESHWATER: So then that helps filter things for the NIT downstairs because they're, of course, 22 23 going completely crazy, probably like you guys are, too.

NIKITA: Thank you.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Thank you.

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NIKITA: Take care. DAVE FRESHWATER: Bye. (CONFERENCE CALL ENDED) **NEAL R. GROSS**

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(CONFERENCE CALL INITIATED)

MAJOR DUNLAP: NIT Ops, Dunlap.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Hey Major Dunlap. This is Dave Freshwater up at NRC Liaison.

MAJOR DUNLAP: How you doing, sir?

DAVE FRESHWATER: Pretty good. Hey, my -just so you know, my phone line's recorded. Hey, I sent
a message down to NIT Ops right around 1:00 about some
international liaison questions.

MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay.

DAVE FRESHWATER: And they've followed up twice to see if we've got any answers.

MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay. I'm going back and look at your email. Freshwater, David from NRC. Signed forward -- let's see. Forward this message. A minute, I'm pulling up the message to see who I forwarded it to.

DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.

(Pause)

MAJOR DUNLAP: It's going to take a second, sir. Sorry.

DAVE FRESHWATER: No, that's okay. No, I just was going to -- I was just calling to remind you of it. I'm going to walk some of these down because

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when I leave there won't be anybody here until like Monday according to the current plan. So I'll walk back through all these and make sure we can go back over there and make sure we know what the path forward is and what I can tell the people here on what kind of, how we're going to get answers back to them, you know, come up with an approach on it. But I just wanted -- I know this one is one 10 of their burning ones because that briefing in Vienna's at like 9:00 tomorrow morning their time, which is 4:00 11 12 in the morning ours. 13 MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay. You need to forward it to the Policy Group. There's been no response from 14 15 Policy. They are swamped with all kinds of crap. 16 DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. 17 MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay, let me -- let's see. Debbie's here. Do you want to speak to her? Is this 18 19 an important enough level and get her in on this? Sounds like it. 20 21 DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes. I think so. 22 MAJOR DUNLAP: Okay. Stand by. 23 DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Thanks. 24 (Pause) 25 DEBBIE: Hey Dave. Hold on. I'm just

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1	reading this.
2	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. Sure Debbie. Hey,
3	you need to know, too, that my line is recorded.
4	DEBBIE: Okay. Thank you.
5	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes, so don't say anything
6	about how stupid I am.
7	DEBBIE: You're awesome Dave. All right,
8	what it hold on Dave.
9	DAVE FRESHWATER: Sure.
10	(Pause)
11	DEBBIE: Okay. It's already been sent to
12	you guys
13	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes.
14	DEBBIE: to the NRC.
15	DAVE FRESHWATER: Yes, but the NRC has it,
16	but I think we, as I recall, we put a caveat on it that
17	they can't essentially distribute it to other governmental.
18	And then in this case it's not just other governmental
19	agencies. We're talking about other governments is
20	what's being asked here.
21	DEBBIE: Yes. We cannot exchange this with
22	other governments.
23	DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay.
24	DEBBIE: That is a decision that has been
25	made out of the (b)(5) with
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the Deputy. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. DEBBIE: Soif there is a request for release, and NRC feels it needs to be elevated, it needs to be elevated to that Deputy for discussion and concurrence. DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. No I'll take --I just wanted to -- I know that they just got the questions and so we, you know, that's why we asked the thing. And part of the reason, you know, this is one of their burning ones because obviously this guy 10 over there is supposed to brief at 9:00 in the morning 11 12 Vienna time, which is 4:00 in the morning ours. 13 DEBBIE: Who? DAVE FRESHWATER: His ambassador wanted him 14 15 to brief, to task this former NRC staffer who's now on 16 the Vienna Embassy staff. And the Ambassador also invited 17 the other ambassadors in Vienna to come and get briefed. 18 DEBBIE: Okay. 19 DAVE FRESHWATER: And it's kind of a regular briefing. 20 21 DEBBIE: Right. That needs to be approved up(b)(5),(b)(6)22 23 DAVE FRESHWATER: Okay. No, I understand. 24I followed it because I'm only going to be here for 25 about another hour. I know there's some other things

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1	that I've sent down that haven't heard answers back on,
2	and
3	DEBBIE: Okay. What else can I do you for?
4	DAVE FRESHWATER: Well, I'll walk through
5	them and call back to make sure we've got a good hand
6	over because they said we don't have to have somebody
